GARDEN MEMORY My parents were not "gardeners" but they each had their own area of some success in the garden. My Mom always grew a few tomato plants in a small plot against the house in our very ordinary 60's era suburban neighborhood. That spot got the sun all day long as well as the reflection from the standard issue white stucco and the tomatoes grew well. Dad's thing was the lawn. The yard was just weeds and rock when we bought the house, never having been touched since the construction process several years before. He spent many, many weekends raking and grading. Being the engineer that he is, he even got out the surveying equipment to make sure the slope was just so. The final touch to his masterpiece was a pick-up truck load of chicken manure. The manure was off-loaded into a nice pile about 5 feet in diameter and 3 feet high. I was standing on the back gate of the pick-up truck and being only 8 or 9 I did not really understand what chicken manure was. And a sprinkling of sawdust over the top of the pile (to quell the odor) made it look like a nice big pile of dirt. Just what a little tom boy like me should jump on - right? So jump I did and the manure went right up and over and into my boots. Well, the upshot of the story was that Dad got a beautiful green lawn, Mom (who got a few shovels-full out of the pile) got extra good tomatoes for several years, they both got an embarrassing story about their daughter that they love to tell new acquaintances and I never got to wear those boots again. - Michele Peltonen
