Lucy Davenport, who lives in Portland, Oregon, has agreed to speak to us, next Wednesday. Ms. Davenport owns "Bonsai Akira, " a bonsai nursery. You may have met her and discovered her bonsai offerings at "Art in the Garden," at Bellevue Botanical Garden, this year or last. She will speak on "The Basics of Bonsai."

Ms. Davenport states: "Ten years ago, after a career in community service, I discovered my love for the art of bonsai. It quickly took hold of my life, and in 2015, I launched my Bonsai nursery, Bonsai Akira, in my back garden. "Akira" means "brilliance" in Japanese, and, by extension, "clarity". This exploration of what makes bonsai speak to the viewer has led me to the idea of bonsai as a mirror for our inward connection with the natural world.

As a self-taught artist, I am always learning from the trees and shrubs in my care. Hours spent scouring nursery stock for specimen plants that might yield beautiful structure and years discovering how to enhance structure and form have followed. A lifetime as a hobby gardener has given me training in pruning and horticulture. Explorations in poetry have taught me how a minimum of words can convey enormous meaning—and the small trees express themselves as miniature renderings of the natural realm."

On June 12 we visited Powellswood Gardens in south Seattle. This was an impressive garden, smack in the middle of a 1950's housing development—though you'd never know that, if you'd kept your eyes closed on the way.

On July 25, we visited Soos Creek Botanical Garden and Heritage Center ibn Auburn. This is sited on land originally purchased from the Northern Pacific Railroad for \$10 an acre! Five acres of this land was purchased in the 1960's and more property was added, subsequently. For over forty years, the owner enhanced the original plantings with a large selection of conifers, azaleas, rhododendrons, and other evergreen shrubs. These have grown into some of the larger specimens in the garden. Over the years, the gardens have been developed with choice plants. September, 2019

Visit the NPA Peren-Border nial this month to see Amarcrinum, an intergeneric cross between Amaryllis and Crinum. Displaying the best of both parents, it blooms in late summer with large pink flowers rising from bold. lush strapshaped leaves.



- Soil moisture is still low, so you may need to water perennials.
- Reduce water to your trees and shrubs to keep them from putting out soft new growth that will then be killed by frost.
- Fertilize your lawn as it comes back into winter growth.
- Begin planting trees and shrubs, but hold off on dividing fleshy perennials until spring.
- Plan your fall garden edits but wait until plants are dormant to move them around!
- Revel in your dahlias.
